INTERIM NOTES



Tuesday, November 7th is, as most of us know. elec-

tion day. We also realize that it is our civic duty to vote for those candidates that we believe will best serve our community, state, and nation. It is, I believe, our duty as children of Christ to vote—and to vote wisely.

There are many churches, mostly on the right but some on the left, that advocate aggressive Christian participation in politics. They are very clear: faith in Christ means that you will vote for the candidates and policies of one

party or the other. Or, at least, Christians will vote only for those who agree with the "Christian position" on one or more hot items, such as gun control or gay rights. Such Christian advocacy churches and groups have allowed themselves to become identified with one party, and there is some evidence that politicians have sometimes cynically used their support without honoring (let alone sharing) their faith.

What attitudes, then, do we take to the polls as Christians? How do we follow Christ's way as we

vote? First and most obviously, we need to go beyond the mud-slinging and stay focused on the central issues facing our communities, state, and nation. With our votes and, where we can, with our voices we need to encourage our politicians to move beyond dirt and rhetoric.

Second, we hear a great deal about security these days. Both of the major parties claim that we will be more secure under their leadership. Less often but still frequently, they talk

Prospective pastors have their own form to fill out (a Pastor Information Form [PIF]—who'd have guessed it?), which is also entered into the database. Then a match is made between pastors and churches, sort of like a computer dating service.

Anyway, Session received the draft CIF and reviewed it. Then Session met with the PNC met and gave us their feedback. We are now planning to meet a few more times to incorporate Session's suggestions into the CIF. After this it will be signed off by session, and then (hopefully) by the presbytery. Shortly afterwards we'll be "in the system" and receiving PIFs to look over. Keep us in your prayers.

Advent Calendar

You are invited to a fun-filled, eventful Advent season at Holly PC. Please, mark these dates on your calendar and plan to bring family, friends, neighbors, and colleagues along, too.

Things start out with **Decoration Week**, which is the week of **Monday**, **November 27th through Saturday**, **December 2nd**. The whole church building will be decorated in stages during the week so that it shines and sparkles on **Sunday**, **December 3nd**, the first Sunday of Advent. 



... continued from page 1 about peace, which seems to be equated usually with security. If we're secure, then we're at peace. From Christian perspective security and peace are not the same thing at all. Peace is a deeper inner quality of quiet, patient assurance. Christians experience peace in situations that others find threatening and insecure. Peace, furthermore, is not so much something we have as something we give. Finally, from a biblical perspective it is impossible to separate peace from justice. As Christians, we are convinced that our communities, state, and nation can be secure and peaceful only to the extent that our citizens feel that they get a fair shake from society.

Third, as Christians our political concerns are global. The United States is widely considered to be the world's only super power. That places on each of us as American citizens a serious responsibility to consider how our nation contributes to or fails to contribute to international security, peace, and justice. We seek a just and equitable society for the entire world-not as a matter of national security for America, but because God

in Christ calls us to love and minister to the whole world.

Fourth, our Christian concern does not extend just to other peoples. It includes all of God's good creation. We encourage our elected leaders to pursue policies that will clean up the environment and protect it from abuse.

Finally, as both citizens and Christians, we need to reject one-issue voting and thinking. It is important that we do not judge our leaders and candidates on the basis of just one issue, be it gun control, abortion, or whatever. A given politician can be "right" on one hot

button issue and still be very, very wrong for our nation.

As Christians, in sum, we affirm the relevance of our faith to our politics. We simply do not agree with those who claim that religion has nothing to do with the political process. Our goal is Christ's goal: a world that is at peace, a world regulated by justice, and a world driven by compassion. I would like to urge every member and friend of Holly PC to exercise their civic and Christian duty on November 7th.




