In many church circles these days, one of the most hotly discussed issues is "church health." Dozens of books and thousands of articles have been written on the subject, and there are a multitude of descriptions of what is means to be a healthy church. All of this attention on church health is surely one symptom of the slow but steady decline of the mainline denominations as well as declining interest in religious institutions. (For example, our own Lake Huron Presbytery has been losing members steadily for years. In 2005 its churches lost another 2.9% in total membership). If things were going "great guns" in the mainline churches there wouldn't be all of this talk about church health.

The health of a church affects every member. Healthy congregations inspire spiritual health and growth. Unhealthy members on the other hand fail to facilitate and may even get in the way of our spiritual well being.

So, what is a healthy church? Different authors emphasize different pieces of the pie, but there are some common threads in their answers. A healthy church consciously follows Christ. Now, some of you are thinking, "No, duh!" But, I suspect one of the most common sources of "unwell" churches is that they give lip service to following Christ but don't incorporate his compassionate style of servanthood in their own lives. Food For Thought: Going to Church is Good For Us!


Recent research conducted by the Pew Research Center shows that people who regularly attend worship are happier than those who do not. Of those who go to church weekly, 43% report themselves to be "very happy." For people who attend once a month or less, some 31% say they are very happy. And for those who seldom or never attend worship, only 26% claim to be very happy. These figures hold for Catholics, Evangelical Protestants, and mainline Protestants-the more American Christians attend worship the more likely they are to be happy.

The question the research does not answer is what is the cause and what is the effect. Does going to

church make people happier? Or, are happy people more likely to go to church? It may work both ways. In any event and apart from its other rewards, going church is good for us. It brings us into contact with more happy people than we're likely to meet anywhere else. In sum, worship seems to inspire happiness in us and reinforce the happiness we bring with us. So, come to church! It'll do ya good! ■




Make a

The butterfly is a symbol of new life and of the Resurrection. After three days, Jesus rose from the dead and gave us hope for a new life.

What you need:

- Bible verse Luke 24:5-6 (NIV)
- tempera paint or acrylic paint
- paintbrush
- 1 sheet of light-colored construction paper

■ paper towel or baby wipe



What to do:

1. Draw a picture of a butterfly's body. Make it wide enough to write this verse inside the body:

"Why do you look for the living among the dead? He is not here; he has risen!" Luke 24:5-6 (NIV)

- 2. Use the paintbrush to paint the palm of your hand.
- 3. Make a butterfly wing with your handprint by pressing vour hand down next to the butterfly body.
- 4. Clean your hand with the paper towel or baby wipe.
- 5. Repeat steps 2-4 with the other hand.
- 6. Let the butterfly remind you of the sacrifice Jesus made for us and of the beauty of his Resurrection.

TEENS FOR CHRIST


March TFC News

don't walk the walk." They don't practice forgiveness and love. They don't speak out against injustice. They allow unhealthy practices in the church to go unchecked.

Another key mark is that healthy churches have a sense of vision. They look to the future with excitement and commitment. The members believe that their church is on a path leading them to more fruitful times. A healthy church is both contented in its experience of God's grace and restless to grow in faith and service.

Healthy churches are growing churches.

They grow spiritually, in their knowledge of the Bible, in service to the world, and in numbers. Healthy churches attract new members by the quality of their congregational life. However, we need to keep the horse in front of the cart here: spiritual growth and a healthy congregational life are the numerical seeds of growth-not the other way around. And in some situations, such as declining rural areas, churches can be healthy without growing numerically.

Another surprising characteristic is this: healthy churches do not fear conflict. Numerous authors make the point that conflict is a normal

part of any church's life and plays an important part in maintaining church health. Healthy churches see conflict as a challenge rather than a threat. They encourage dialogue where there is disagreement and forgiveness where there is misunderstanding. Conflict can help us grow and learn.

Healthy churches have a lively, meaningful, and attractive worship life. The members attend worship because they want to give worship to God and because they find meaning in the service of worship. Several authors make the point that the form of worship (traditional, blended, or contemporary) is not as

important as its quality.

There is no such thing, obviously, as a perfectly healthy church. Health is not a steady thing. We can be healthy and still come down with serious illnesses. Thus, we have to always, always reflect on the current state of the church. How healthy is it? What are the challenges and obstacles a church faces in staying healthy? What is the role of the pastor, the session, and other church groups in church health? These questions and the marks of church health are especially worth asking and pondering in an interim period, such as the one Holly PC is going through now. Herb

MISSION: JUAREZ, MEXICO

Crossing the border to Mexico you go straight from hotels, buildings, and houses into a bigger reality. Shacks line down the streets serving as homes to the poor families in Juarez. Many move to the area to work in near by factories thinking it to be a great temporary investment. They come with the idea that they will make enough money to send back home but unfortunately this is not how it works out. Generations end up staying in this impoverished community. Their lack of money turns this community to take certain measures that drive from their creativity. Walls are built from old tires. Ever see those large wooden crates food is carried in? The sides of the old crates serve as fences to their homes. Our group, during the day, split up into three different work groups. One group dug dirt leveling out a street damaged from erosion. Another group worked at a local place where a soup kitchen is held at that we all worked at on Wednesday afternoon. They fixed the building's roof and did some painting. My group worked at a church. We dry walled a bathroom, tiled a floor, and texturized walls in a Sunday school room. We worked with some guys from a drug rehab, center near by who were just overly delighted by the Lord and to be working for God! At night we came back as a group and ate dinner together. We then had some sort of activity and worship. Some of the activities included getting ice cream, visiting a local church, having a cook out with the guys from the center, and going on a scavenger hunt where w e learned more about the city with everything we found. Each day I became closer to God and felt at It's a home. strange thing when you realize that living in a shack with only cold water and





11 other girls in bunks in the city of Juarez is your own "comfort zone". The only thing I felt I was lacking was the fact that I knew no Spanish, (not my straightener, make-up, cherished computer, or anything else I did without that week)! I'd just like to thank the church again for making this experience possible. It was so amazing!
