

Huron Presbytery has been losing members steadily for years. In 2005 its churches lost another 2.9% in total membership). If things were going "great guns" in the mainline churches there wouldn't be all of this talk about church health.

The health of a church affects every member. Healthy congregations inspire spiritual health and growth. An unhealthy church on the other hand fail to facilitate and may even get in the way of our spiritual well being.

So, what is a healthy church? Different authors emphasize different pieces of the pie, but there are some common threads in their answers. A healthy church consciously follows Christ. Now. some of you are thinking, "No, duh!" But, I suspect one of the most common sources of "unwell" churches is that they give lip service to following Christ but don't incorporate his compassionate style of servant hood in their own lives "They talk the talk, but they

Food For Thought: God is both In and Out

Religion and spirituality dominate our national life in a way that has not been true since the 19th century. Even among Americans who refuse to become involved in religious organizations and groups, many claim to have a faith in God. With all of this interest in spirituality, we would think that Americans are changing the way they behave as well as believe. Recent research by the Barna Group, a Christian research agency, suggests otherwise.

That research indicates that 62% of Americans believe themselves to be "deeply spiritual." When, however, the Barna researchers studied the priorities of their sample group, only 16% of all adults listed faith as their highest priority. The great majority said that family was their first priority. Among those who considered themselves living full-time lives for God and to be deeply spiritual, only 20-25% stated that faith is their first priority. This was true even those who affirmed that the "single, most important purpose of your life is to love God with all your heart, mind, strength and soul."

What strange results! The head of the Barna Group, George Barna, states, "Spirituality is in vogue in our society today. It is popular to claim to be part of a 'faith community' or to have a spiritual commitment. But what do Americans mean when they claim to be 'spiritual?' The recent Grammy awards were perhaps indicative of this breakdown between self-perception



and reality. The members of the group that won the award for best song thanked God for the victory then immediately followed with profanities that had to be bleeped from the broadcast.

It seems as if God is in, but living for God is not. Many Americans are living a dual life – one filled with good feelings about God and faith, corroborated by some simple religious practices, and another in which they believe they are in control of their own destiny and operate apart from Him." Barna concludes, "It certainly seems that millions of Americans are fooling themselves into thinking that they have found the appropriate balance between God and lifestyle." We do live in a strange world!

Nights filling in for a bit.



don't walk the walk." They don't practice forgiveness and love. They don't speak out against injustice. They allow unhealthy practices in the church to go unchecked.

Another key mark is that healthy churches have a sense of vision. They look to the future with excitement and commitment. The members believe that their church is on a path leading them to more fruitful times. healthy church is both contented in its experience of God's grace and restless to grow in faith

Healthy churches are growing churches.

They grow spiritually, in their knowledge of the Bible, in service to the world, and in numbers. Healthy churches attract new members by the quality of their congregational life. However, we need to keep the horse in front of the cart here: spiritual growth and a healthy congregational life are the of numerical growth-not the other way around. And in some situations, such as declining rural areas, churches can be healthy without growing numerically.

Another surprising characteristic is this: healthy churches do not fear conflict. Numerous authors make the point that conflict is a normal part of any church's life and plays an important part in maintaining church health. Healthy churches see conflict as a challenge rather than a threat. They encourage dialogue where there is disagreement and forgiveness where there is misunderstanding. Conflict can help us grow and learn.

Healthy churches have a lively meaningful. and attractive worship life. The members attend worship because they want to give worship to God and because they find meaning in the service of wor-Several authors make the point that the of worship (traditional, blended, or

There is no such thing, obviously, as a perfectly healthy church. Health is not a steady thing. We can be healthy and still come down with serious illnesses. Thus. we have to always, always reflect on the current state of the church. How healthy is it? What are the challenges and obstacles a church faces in staying healthy? What is the role of the pastor, the session, and other church groups in church health? These questions and the marks of church health are especially worth asking and pondering in an interim period, such as the one Holly PC is going contemporary) is not as through now. -Herb

Worship in May

Worship at Holly PC in May will focus on our relationship with God in life and worship.

On Sunday, May 7th, we will share together in the sacrament of the Lord's Supper, and the service and sermon will look at God and worship at Holly PC. How is God present with us as we worship? How can we prepare ourselves to discover God in worship?

The following Sunday, May 14th, is Mothers' Day. To add a little zest to the day, the sermon will wrestle with the gender of God. Is God male? This sermon will take us into the realm of using "politically correct language" about God.

How does our relationship to God influence our understanding of our nation?

The themes of both the services and sermons will be a mixture of Christian celebration & joy and Christian challenge & reflection. The hope is that these four services will involve both your hearts and your heads—as good Presbyterian services always should! Holly PC is a good place to be on Sunday Morning. ■

Thoughts for Memorial Day

The anthropologist and naturalist, Loren Eiseley, who died in 1977, wanted this epitaph for his wife and himself: "We loved the earth, but could not stay."

No one can stay, of course. We all are moving inexorably toward that final day when "the shadows lengthen, and the evening comes, and the busy world is hushed and the fever of life is over, and our work is done" (Book of Common Prayer).

This Memorial Day we particularly remember the men and women who have perished in war, giving the ultimate sacrifice to make the world a better place. They too "loved the earth, but could not stay." May God hasten the day when we can solve our disputes peacefully.

We also remember all our loved ones whose stay on Earth

is over. Christians believe that death does not end all. We trust that the God who made us will provide for us when our bodies can no longer sustain us.

A memorial stone on the campus of the College of Wooster in Ohio, placed there by a class many years ago, reads:

United in time Divided in time To be reunited When time shall be no more.

That is a hope we can have for ourselves, our loved ones and those who sacrificed all. ■

A Cheerful Bouquet for Mother Make a heautiful bouquet

Make a beautiful bouquet for your mom that will cheer her up for many days — and it doesn't need any water or sunshine!

What you need:

- 12 bendable straws
- colored construction paper,
 colored card stock or craft foam
- craft glue
- hole punch
- bud vase or terra cotta pot
- clay or play dough (optional)
- scissors
- pencil

What you will do:

- 1. Cut the colored paper, card stock or foam (or a combination) into 24 or more flower shapes and 24 or more leaf shapes (about 1-2 inches). Make them different sizes and colors.
- 2. Punch a hole in the center of each flower and one near the base of each leaf.
- 3. Bend each straw and push the flower shapes (2 or more layered on top of each other) onto the short end of the straw. Do not go past the bend.
- 4. Put a little glue behind the flower at the hole to hold it in place.
- 5. From the bottom of the straw, slide 1 or 2 leaf shapes onto the straw and glue them in place from underneath.
- 6. After the glue has dried, put your flowers in a bud vase or display them in a terra cotta pot.*
- 7. *If you use a terra cotta pot, place a fist-sized ball of clay or play dough in the bottom of the pot. Push the straw ends into the clay or play dough. When the clay or dough dries out, it keeps the flowers arranged without them falling over

Your mother will appreciate the time and love you put into making this cheerful bouquet for her.


Lastly, our regularly scheduled meeting is May 7 after church. A field trip is scheduled details will be forthcom-
