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For virtually all of us, anxiety and suffering are important experiences. No one can avoid them, and for many individuals they are a part of daily life. One of the most important sources of anxiety and suffering is our physical condition. It seems like a thousand things can go wrong with our bodies and the bodies of those we love. Physical ailments can cause a lot of pain, which soon gets in the way of healing; and they can cause even more anxiety. Our mental condition is also often the cause of anxiety and suffering to ourselves and to others around us. We can wrap ourselves up in terrible knots sometimes. We see members of our family or friends or a neighbor do the same thing, and it hurts us too. Our family situation is another source of anxiety and suffering. Some of the worst hurts we experience come at the hands of those we love. Family violence and abuse are potent reminders of how hurtful family members can be to each other. And there are deep wounds that we carry around with us for our whole lives, which were inflicted on us as children. For many of us, our situation at work, in an organization (such as the church), or in our neighborhoods (apartment buildings) can also afflict us with pain and suffering: a colleague who dumps on us, a person who takes an unkind jab at us, or a disagreement that leaves us feeling hurt and resentful. The world's condition also brings us anxiety and suffering. Events like Pearl Harbor, the assassination of President Kennedy, and 9/11 cause deep anxiety in us. Many of us feel pain at the destruction of the natural environment or







Make . Prayer Calendar





over destructive ethnic, racial, gender, and other biases. War. Economic Collapse. Riots. Terrorism. All of these forces can touch us in very personal ways.

Always, we have to remember that there is much more to life than our hurts and anxieties, but we also can't deny how suffering is an important and unavoidable part of life, Sometimes

As Christians, however, we believe that all of human pain and suffering takes place in a "divine context." God is there. God shares the pain. What hurts us hurts

God works under-God. neath the pain to give us comfort in the midst of our pain, hope in the midst of our fears, and patience when we want to be rid of our pain. We know this to be true because of Christ. We affirm that in Jesus, son of Joseph & Mary, God took on a body-a real human body that could ache, get splinters, suffer diarrhea, be wounded, and die. In Jesus, God was betrayed by people he loved. He was lied to and treated as an enemy by the big shots of his day.

Knowing that God has gone through human suffering gives us a slightly different perspective on pain and suffering. We realize that pain and suffering are not necessarily evil. Just as the body experiences pain as a warning that something is wrong physically, so our anxieties serve to warn us that there is something wrong. Sometimes there is something wrong with us. We are the cause or contribute to the cause of our own suffering and that of others around us. Furthermore, Christ's suffering teaches us that we can experience God's grace through suffering. The fact that Christ suffered for us also gives us hope, which allows us to patiently worth through our anxieties and suffering or endure them. Suffering reminds us of what is important in life; many of the things we get so worked up over are petty compared to the suffering and sorrow of our world.

Suffering, finally, can teach us to be more sensitive to the pain of others. That, I believe, is the direction God is pulling us to go. As God is a source of strength, courage, and healing for us, so we share the experience of God's grace with others. The Christian experience is that we are healed as we heal, comforted when we give comfort, and we grow in wisdom & faith as we give ourselves in service. Amen.







Our board, volunteers, and the churches we work with have been helpful in every way, and we are praying for more spiritual impact this year.
