WORKING WITH OUR PASTOR

Part Two: "The Job"

Like every job, being a pastor has its pressures and challenges. There are blessings as well. Other members of Holly Presbyterian Church beside the pastor have difficult, dethose jobs as our minister does to being a pastor. Still, being a pastor is not easy, and it is very different from other jobs and professions.

One key difference between being a pastor and holding down other jobs is in the range of tasks a pastor has to carry out. Our pastor has to have skills for: (1) public speaking; (2) administration; (3) counseling; (4) public relations; (5) teaching; (6) research & reflection; (7) the dramatic arts; (8) music; (9) financial management; (10) leading meetings and discussions; (11) supervising staff; (12) social work ... and, well, you get the idea.

Pastors, as a matter of course, work six-day weeks. The up side is that the pastor can usually manage her schedule so there is enough "down time," especially in a smaller church like ours. The down side is that he has to work when the rest of us are free,

which is evenings and weekends. Our pastor also has to be ready to drop everything when there is a death or other crisis. It is also difficult sometimes to take a real day off so that manding jobs. They devote as much time to the pastor can end up working 28 days out of 30. Burn out is a real danger. It happens more often that many people realize.

> Part of the problem is that most pastors are driven to succeed. They are deeply committed to Christ's cause and the church. They care about the members of the church. And there's also the pressure of keeping the church alive and healthy in our modern age. So, there's a lot of internal and external pressure to work hard and ignore the pastor's own needs (and sometimes, health).

Expectations are another important facet of the job. Church members and others expect pastors to be God's representatives. They Another challenge our pastor faces is time. expect ministers to behave in ways they don't even expect themselves to behave. So, we hear things like, "A minister shouldn't say such things!" "How could he do that!" Pastors also hold themselves to a higher standard, which can sometimes lead to a lot of guilt.



Saginaw Second seeks Youth Ministry Director



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WORKING WITH OUR PASTOR CONTINUED

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People *expect* that the pastor will work well with every age group. The pastor has to have good political skills without ever appearing to be a politician. Parishioners *expect* their pastor to be bold and decisive and laid back and easy going all at the same time. They want the pastor to take charge without being in charge.

We should also be aware of the strange employment situation facing the pastor at Presbyterian churches. If you are a member of the church, your pastor is your employee. You help pay her salary. You elect the session, which exercises some oversight over the work of your pastor. In congregational meetings, you vote to approve the pastor's "terms of call." And yet, the pastor has a large fund of authority in the church. He or she runs things in a lot of ways. In the Presbyterian system, the pastor is not a member of the church but a member of presbytery. It is the presbytery, not the session, that has final authority over the pastor. Most employees work in situations where the lines of authority are clear; this is not the case with a minister. All of this is complicated and can be confusing to church members and to the pastor.

Yet another difficult aspect of being a pastor is that pastors are called upon to minister to people facing crises, especially when a loved one dies.

We have to emphasize, again, that being the pastor at Holly PC is not an unusually difficult job or nothing but sacrifice. Being a pastor is not easy, but it has its blessings and benefits too. Lots of other people have jobs that are just as difficult, sometimes without some of the benefits pastors have. Our pastor, as a Presbyterian, has a good pension and health benefits plan. As ministers' salaries go, Presbyterian salaries are good ones. There are informal support systems for the pastor in the church and in the presbytery that help a minister cope with the hard times

Still, being the pastor of Holly Presbyterian Church isn't easy. So, how can you help our minister do her or his job well? How can you help create a Christ-like environment for your minister to work in? Here are some ideas:

- Honor the pastor's need for a day off. Don't ask the pastor to engage even in "social" activities on that day. Our pastor really, really needs to have one day off a week, which means a day away from ALL of us.
- Do not engage in gossip about our pastor and don't listen to those who do. Gossip doesn't just hurt the pastor. It hurts the church. If there is a problem, talk to the pastor or share your concern with a member of the session.
- Always keep the pastor informed about pastoral concerns. Our pastor wants to pray for you, visit you in times of need, and share in your sorrows and joys. When you or someone in your family or the church needs pastoral care, tell the pastor.
- As an employer, treat the pastor as you would want to be treated by an employer. Apply Christian values of patience, compassion, and kindness. Especially, remember that the pastor has financial needs, too. Encourage Holly Presbyterian Church to be as generous and responsible as possible in its terms of call.
- Be aware that the pastor is responsible for his duties and not the whole life of the church. The session is the elected body that has that responsibility.
- **LOVE** our pastor as we would have our pastor love us. ■


