### **WORKING WITH OUR PASTOR**

Part One: "A Healthy Relationship"

Our personal relationship with our pastor is an important one. We appreciate a smile or a kind word from the pastor. We value the leadership the pastor gives to the church. In times of personal crisis, the minister is someone we can turn to for help and comfort. Even in this day and age, the minister is a role model, a person we can look up to and respect.

Over the next few months, the Newsletter will carry a series of articles entitled "Working with Our Pastor." Their purpose is to help members and friends of the church *imagine* how they want to relate to their minister and *learn* how to manage that relationship so it will be a healthy,

happy one. This month, we begin by considering what a healthy relationship between pastor and parishioner looks like. What is a good relationship between us as members of the church and our pastor?

A healthy pastor-parishioner relationship has the following characteristics:

- It is built on *trust*. We trust the pastor to be there when we need her or him, to think kindly of us, and to have our best interests at heart. At the same time, we are trustworthy. We are there when our pastor needs us, think kindly of him, and have her best interests at heart.



# Holly Area Youth Assistance Mentors PLUS



## Peacemakers invited to Synod Justice and Peacemaking Network Gathering

Gospel and for the church. While we may hold opinions different from those of our pastor, we share a real concern for the Christian faith and a love of the church. We are working for the same ends.

- It is a *loving, caring* relationship. Just as the pastor gives each of us pastoral care, so we individually give "parishional care" to the pastor. As we value the pastor's kind words, so we have kind words for our minister.
- It is an *honest* relationship. We can have differences and talk about them. We can tell the pastor how we honestly feel about things, expecting that he or she will understand our ideas, concerns, and feelings. The pastor can speak honestly to us personally and from the pulpit, expecting that we will understand her or his ideas, concerns, and feelings.
- It is a relationship that can be *repaired* when problems arise. Both pastor and parishioner are willing to work towards mutual understanding and reconciliation when misunderstandings arise or there is a break in the relationship.

A healthy relationship between our pastor and us, then, is based on trust and shared concerns. It is a loving caring, honest, and forgiving relationship.

We rightly expect that the pastor will be a model of Christ for our families, the community, and us personally. We understand that pastors are no more perfect than we are, but we do expect that a minister will do his or her best to be a model. In the same way, we must also be models of Christ for our families, neighbors, colleagues, friends at church, and our pastor. Our relationship with the pastor, in short, is a relationship based on Christ's teachings and example.

One thing we need to emphasize is that each member of the church has a responsibility for how we relate to the pastor. Our relationship with the minister is a **relationship**. It is between two people. It is 50-50. Too often, members tend to think that somehow the minister is more responsible for the relationship we have with her or him. That is not the case. Our relationship with the pastor is between two adults, not an adult and a child.

Although it will probably be a few months yet before our new pastor arrives, it would be a good thing for each of us to sit down for a few minutes and think about how we can welcome the new minister and start to build our own positive, friendly, caring relationship with the pastor. The question is, "What can I do to have a good relationship with my minister?"

By maintaining a healthy relationship with our pastor, we contribute to making Holly Presbyterian Church a healthy, alive church. We contribute to the work of the pastor and the ministries of the church. ■

### Why Go To Church?

A Church goer wrote a letter to the editor of a newspaper and complained that it made no sense to go to church every Sunday.
