### FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

Dear friends,

A Sunday school Superintendent once wrote of an experience with a new little visitor at his church. He said that one Sunday a new family walked in to the church with their three young girls. The youngest one's name was Sarah. He told her that he was glad she had come to Sunday School, at which point she proceeded to kick him in the shin rather hard. But Mr. Dailey resolved to be kind to her. The very next week he welcomed Sarah with determined friendliness, and again she kicked him - this time in both shins. This behavior continued for several more weeks along with chants of, "I hate vou. Mr. Dailey." Nevertheless, he continued to be nice to the disturbed child. Well, time passed on, and one Sunday Mr. Dailey went into the kindergarten room and noticed that the boys and girls were seated in a circle listening to bible stories. He tiptoed in, got a tiny chair for himself and sat down at the edge of the circle. Fairly soon one of the boys got up and went over to sit on Mr. Dailey's leg. Then, to his astonishment, Sarah stood up and went over and sat on his other leg. She didn't say anything but reached out and took his hand. Mr. Dailey thought, "Maybe things will work out after all." And they apparently did.

In a graphic way this little story illustrates the two basic conditions of people in God's kingdom on earth. There are some who act like Sarah, who need the light of love more than anything. No matter how many times they kick people's shins, they still desire to be held and loved. They seek out the ones who offer light but kick them in the shins anyway. Even some of us look for the ones who offer light with their lives, but allow them to get kicked a few times before they go away.

Then there is the second kind of person who is like the Superintendent, the one who knows the light of Christ's love and that it is stronger than anything the shin kickers can offer. The light giver knows that the reason little Sarahs kick shins is because they are so in need of Christ's love, but will seldom admit their need. That is the one reason Jesus said that the eyes are the light of the soul.

The difference between the shin kickers and the Light givers is well expressed in a familiar secular parable:

One there was a frog. But he wasn't really a frog. He was a prince who looked and felt like a frog. A wicked witch had cast a spell on him and only the kiss of a beautiful maiden could save him. But no one wanted to kiss this frog. So there he sat – an unkissed prince in frog form. One day, along came a beautiful maiden who gave this frog a great big kiss. Crash – Boom – Zap. There he was – a handsome, dashing prince. And you know the rest of the story.

So what is the task of the church? To kiss frogs, of course! It is to the Sarahs who have received the light of our Lord that the light giver addresses this comment: "No one lights a lamp and puts it under his bowl: instead he outs it on his lamp stand, where it gives light for everyone in the house." Let us all remember the depressed, those who are in pain, or who are irritable. All of us can share the Light. "In the same way your light must shine before people, so that they will see the good things you do and praise your Father in heaven." (Matthew 5:16)

As we take this journey of Lent together, may we remember the Light on the other side of the Cross.

### JUST 4 KIDS



Mix up a batch of these yummy cookies and share with a neighbor or special friend.

### You will need:



- ▼One 6-ounce package of semi-sweet chocolate chips
- ♥One 6-ounce package of butterscotch morsels



- ▼1/4 cup peanut butter
- ♥4 cups Rice Krispies



Get an adult to help you melt chocolate, butterscotch and peanut butter in a double boiler. Stir well until blended. Add Rice Krispies. Drop by spoonfuls onto waxed paper. Let stand until cool and firm.

Make a heart-shaped basket to put them in.

Cut out two circles (from two different colors of paper).

### Healthy aging Web site goes online with focus on positive aging through engagement in church and community

A new Internet Web site aimed at getting Presbyterians 50 and over on the road to healthy aging has been launched by the National Health Ministries (NHM) office of the PC(U.S.A.). Living Longer, Feeling Better (http://www.pcusa.org/healthyliving/) features health and wellness resources to assist older adults in achieving and maintaining good health. It also examines vital roles congregations can play in helping aging members stay fit by keeping them involved in the church and its activities. The Web site's "Tools for Congregations" has suggestions for establishing health-minded church initiatives for aging Presbyterians such as walking programs, health fairs and congregational health ministries. There is information about parish nursing and the Presbyterian-related Association for Retired Ministers, their Spouses or Survivors. Living Longer, Feeling Better explores generally accepted factors that contribute to healthy aging with information about diet and age-specific exercises. Another section of the Web site outlines housing options for retirees such as retirement communities, independent living and shared housing. There is also information related to health issues and caregivers, along with helpful links to Web sites like the Presbyterian Association of Homes and Services for the Aging, and the National Aging in Place Council. National Health Ministries provides resources, health-awareness information and training to individual Presbyterians, congregations and governing bodies in health-related ministries.


