- Develop a dynamic presence in our community under the guidance of the Holy Spirit.






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ANNUAL WINTER CONGREGATIONAL MEETING FEBRUARY 15, 2009

The winter congregational meeting of the Holly Presbyterian Church in Holly, Michigan, was opened with prayer by moderator Randy Cullen in the church sanctuary at 11:43 a.m., immediately following Sunday worship, on February 15, 2009.

Roll was taken and a quorum established with 34 active members in attendance. A motion to approve the docket was sustained.

Randy Cullen presented the Pastor's Report. Highlights of his report

During the past year, we have continued to be a congregation that values meaningful worship, while we make some adjustments to our style and order. Holly Presbyterian Church has been a welcoming congregation, which practices hospitality.

Weddings of Lauren Dryer, Sue Hillman, and Cassie Jackson; and the baptisms of Jeffrey Campbell, Dylan Mayfield, Dianne Novotney, and Stacy Ruffo.

Hospital visits, home visits, and paying calls on potential members.

Cut teaching time at Oakland University in half and continue to teach an occasional class at Ecumenical Theological Seminary.

Conducted funerals for Dryer Funeral Home for families who have no pastor as well as funerals for four of our members.

Worked along with our Church School Director and Christian Education Committee to develop a vision for programs involving our youth and adults.

Two overnights with the Tweens and TYC, respectively, and participated in several of their events throughout the year.

Spoke at the Dryer Funeral Home Annual Christmas Memorial Service.

Preaching and worship are among the most important functions of ministry.

The statistical portion of the Clerk of Session report is summarized as follows: Membership on December 31, 2007 was 12. There were 20 gains and 24 losses, resulting in 116 members on December 31, 2008. There were 4 baptisms for our church in 2008; 2 children and 2 adults. There 3 weddings. The Session in 2008 was made up of 12 Ruling Elders (5 female and 7 male).

Vicki Lyles presented the Treasurer's report. In 2008 the church had \$129,854.25 in income and \$148,332.77 in expenses, which translates to a net loss of \$18,478.52. At the end of 2008 the church's total assets were \$19,091.08, but this amount is offset by a loan from presbytery, the balance of which is \$22,493.22.

New bylaws were proposed by the Bylaws Committee (subcommittee of the Session). The motion to adopt the bylaws as proposed was sustained (the new bylaws as adopted follow these minutes).

Standing committee reports were presented. During the presentation if the Property Committee Report, a motion was sustained that in the event of an emergency failure of the church building's boiler system, the Session is authorized to spend up to \$20,000, and if necessary obtain a loan for the same, for the purpose if replacing the boiler system.

Here are some highlights of the committee reports:

Christian Education, Karen Haneline & Brian Murphree:

The Gathering Place saw increased attendance for the K-6th grade program.

The 2007-2008 Sunday School year ended with an enjoyable picnic in June.

The 2008-2009 year was kicked off with Let's Do Launch, which was an informative/teacher recruiting meeting for the congregation.

The 2008-2009 year included the transition from the standard use of the same teacher each week to a rotating and sign up teaching model.

The 2008-2009 year also started a new study for the high school grades called The Heart of Christianity.

The Sunday School classes ended 2008 in leading the worship service with a great Christmas Pageant entitled "Joy for the World."

There were many successful adult studies last year.

Teens for Christ (TFC) lead by Carlee Muenzer and Tweens for Christ (TwFC) lead by Laura Parker had a very active year.

The Lenten and Advent Fairs again provided great activities for the families of our congregation and the community.

Congregational Care, Kay VanderKuy, Beth Dryer:

Coffee Hour: coffee, juice and snacks were provided for Sunday service during the months September through the beginning of June.

Get well cards, Christmas cards, and simply hello cards to current and former members of our congregation.

Potlucks were held on Ash Wednesday, a soup and bread supper on Maundy Thursday, a bring a friend to dinner potluck on April 20, graduation tea on June 3, a picnic for the church's anniversary on July 31, and an international potluck held in conjunction with World Communion on October 4.

Refreshments were provided refreshment for the Carry Nation parade in September, following the Community Thanksgiving service in November, and following the Ambassadors concert in December.

A Snoop Party was held in November.

Reunion with a Cause donations were collected from the congregation in July/ August. Poinsettias for 8 of our members who are shut-ins.

VG's grocery store receipts were collected throughout the year and turned them in with the proceeds of several hundred dollars going to the church.

Committee member Donna Miller organized and provided several funeral dinners. A garage sale was held in June collecting approximately \$1300 to the church.

Outreach, Walt Brown & Judy Studer:

- o The church Website (www.hollypc.org) continues to function well.
- o Creating top-of-the-mind awareness for our church using a limited budget is a ma-

jor challenge for the committee. Therefore, we have had to limit our publicity in newspapers for special events. We continue to use the *Tri-County Times*' monthly Church Directory to publicize our Sunday school and church service schedules.

- o We are a member of the Holly Chamber of Commerce, which allows us to include our brochures in their "Welcome" packages given to new families in the Holly area. There is no charge for this membership.
- o We arranged for the third annual Fenton High School Ambassadors' Christmas concert the evening of December 7, which once again helped kick-off our church's Advent season.
- o Christmas Joy Offering and One Great Hours of Sharing.
- o The annual Christmas Adopt-A- Family event was once again a big success. We adopted a family consisting of single mother, a 4-year-old girl and 7 1/2 year old boy, and their recently widowed grandmother.

We continued to provide financial support for two Campus Crusade for Christ mission programs: Sarah and Colby Keefer and their work with Athletes in Action at the University of Dayton in Ohio; and Alan and DeeDee Iobst and their work preaching the Gospel to Muslims as they cross between Europe and Africa at Algeciras, Spain.

Personnel, Mary Ann Vergith:

o The employee review plan that was established in 2007 was implemented. Each employee was supplied with a current job description with the understanding that a performance review would be conducted. Each paid employee was reviewed by a personnel committee member, someone directly involved in their area of work and Randy Cullen.

It was decided that Randy Cullen would not have a formal review until 2009, giving both Randy and the congregation time to get familiar with each other.

Property, Broady Cook:

All member workday on Sat., May 17 was every well attended. Projects included:

New vinyl tile flooring in kitchen.

New exterior door installed in kitchen to replace old one.

Screen door repaired in kitchen.

Major outdoor landscaping and clean up.

New landscaping timbers on driveway side replaced the old ones.

Most of the window screens cleaned and installed.

The parking lot lights were repaired and are on a new timer, which turns them off at 12:00 am. to save on the power bill. New flooring and a commercial quality toilet with a 1.5 gallon flush was installed in the restroom next to the kitchen. The handicap bath also received the same a new toilet. The toilet from the handicap restroom received new flush parts inside and replaced a out dated toilet that was run in the lower level restrooms. The backlight on top of the

doghouse rear entry for the stain glass window have been updated with more light power.

A new cleaning company we hired, Cleaning by the Book is performing very well. The boilers are running on God's grace still. The average repair cost per year is almost \$ 2,000.00. The cost to run the boilers when the weather is cold is over \$ 1,000 per month.

Nash landscaping is doing snow removal and salting this year. Dan Nash also is handling the grass cutting.

Stewardship, Brian Parker:

We began 2008 facing some substantial challenges; the proposed budget forecasted a \$35,000.00 deficit based on pledged giving of \$82,000 and other estimated income. Efforts were made to fundraise as well as reduce budgets. The results of these efforts were increase of approximately \$12,000 over the original 2008 estimated income and the actual expenses were \$152,800. The Final actual deficit was \$21,500 which was paid out of church savings account.

Some of the actions that were been taken to decrease the budget and control spending include:

On Staff Custodian has been replaced with a Cleaning Service

More programmable thermostats were installed

Christian budget was reduced

Worship budget was reduced

Newsletter was converted to electronic format

We are again facing similar budgeting challenges. The 2009 Stewardship Pledges totaled \$85,000.00, an increase of \$3,000 more than the previous year. HPC is blessed to see an increase in pledges during this time when many churches are seeing declines. Based on the forecasted expenses and income there is a projected deficit of \$24,000. A major concern is that there is no enough cash savings available to cover any deficit in 2009.

Some of the actions taken to increase income include:

Fundraising Committee (2nd year)

Revenue from Building Use increased

Changes in budget format

Individual fundraisers will be given their own line in the budget.

Building Use will be given a separate line in the budget.

Worship, Randy Cook & Gerry Jackson:

- o A sign-up campaign was started for ushers and lay readers, communion servers, in an effort to try and have members pick the time and service that would suit them which seemed to work well. Some back lighting was added to the banners and some plants in the front of sanctuary behind the choir to help with atmosphere.
- o Pennies from Heaven is still being collected before service. It continues to bring much needed funds for the property.

over and will be organized so that we can find everything. There is no longer a contemporary service. Jordan Howe had gone off to college and we were unable to get a replacement. We continue to look for an alternative.

A report was received from the Women's Group. They contributed \$375 to the HPC general fund in March. They collected and donated Easter baskets, cellophane wrap and the goodies and toys to go in them and donated it all to the Ennis Foundation of Genesee County. They spent \$103.20 for geraniums to plant around the church. Flowers were planted during the all church work day. They donated \$100 to Project Graduation at Holly High School. And they gave \$30 for the material to make a slip cover for a love seat in use in the fellowship hall. The group currently has \$1459.89.

A report was received from HPC-Hikers. This is an informal group connected with the church. It is composed of members and friends of Holly Presbyterian Church who wish to discuss and receive news about going on hikes together. This includes overnight trips, day trips, and short hikes lasting just a few hours. In 2008 the group had a lot of fun including: a full moon evening hike on the Paint Creek Trail; a hike in Seven Lakes State Park; disc golf at Holly Recreation Area; overnight backpacking trip in the Jordan River Valley; hiking, disc golf, and other fun at Kensington Metropark; a weekend backpacking trip to South Manitou Island; a day hike with a picnic lunch at Holly Recreation Area; and a two-hour hike at Highland Recreation Area.

A report was received from the Teens for Christ. In 2008 their activities included participating in the Alma Youth Mix in March. They planned and participated in various missions projects and fundraisers. They attended a retreat at Camp Skyline in August. The Teens for Christ coordinator is Carlee Muenzer.

A motion to receive all the reports was sustained.

Reverend Randy Cullen closed the meeting with prayer at 12:38 a.m.

ANNUAL FALL CONGREGATIONAL MEETING December 6, 2009

The Annual Fall Congregational meeting of the Holly Presbyterian Church in Holly, Michigan, was held in the sanctuary at 11:46 a.m. following Sunday worship on December 6, 2009. The meeting was opened with prayer by Moderator Rev. Randy Cullen. Roll was taken and a quorum established with 40 active members in attendance. Also present was Rev. Louise Brokaw, Executive Presbyter of Lake Huron Presbytery. The docket of this meeting was given the congregation each of the previous two Sundays, as well as published at the church website. Namely:

Elect the 2010 class of elders to the session

Elect members of the congregation to the 2010 Nominating Committee

Elect members to the Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC)

To dissolve our pastoral relationship with Rev. Randy Cullen effective Dec. 31, 2009

To discuss the opportunity for a part time interim pastors relationship with the church

To discuss the possibility of having a part time called pastor in the future <u>Elections</u>: Four 3-year positions and one 2-year position needed to be filled. The Nominating Committee presented the following candidates, listed with the committee on which each candidate would work:

For 3 years:

Jenifer Chanter, Personnel

Dessalee Cook, Worship

Jim Lyles, Clerk (upon Session's Election and Gerry Jackson moving to Outreach)

Brian Parker, Stewardship

For 2 years:

Dan Nash, Property

There were no candidates nominated from the floor. The five candidates were voted onto session unanimously.

The Nominating Committee presented the following candidates to serve on the 2010 Nominating Committee: Broady Cook, Rob Privette, and Roberta Single.

There were no candidates nominated from the floor. The three candidates were voted onto the 2010 Nominating Committee unanimously.

The Nominating Committee presented the following candidates to serve on the Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC) with membership numbers in parentheses:

Gordon Bradshaw (#1446) Randy Cook (#1604) Margaret Perry (#1304) Judy Studer (#1437)

Jim Lyles (#1575)

Mary Ann Vergith (#1564)

Lori Goldsmith (#1637)

There were no candidates nominated from the floor. A motion was made to elect the committee of 7, to allow the committee to drop to as low as 5 members without replacement, and allow the session to select replacements as necessary thereafter. The motion was sustained and the seven candidates were voted onto the PNC unanimously. The Equal Employment Opportunity Policy of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) was discussed and it is the congregation's intent that the PNC will proceed in accordance with that policy.

A motion was proposed to concur with The Rev. Randall Cullen's request to Lake Huron Presbytery that the pastoral relationship existing between Rev. Randall Cullen and the Holly Presbyterian Church of Holly, Michigan, be dissolved, so that he may move on to Maryland effective as of December 31, 2009. Motion was sustained. A motion was made to have Elder Gerry Jackson be present at the next presbytery meeting, Feb. 2, 2010, to verify this action; with Elder Walt Brown to be his backup should Gerry not be able to be present. Motion was sustained.

Moderator Randy Cullen appointed clerk Gerry Jackson to serve as moderator pro tem for discussions regarding the church's future, and then excused himself from the meeting.

Gerry Jackson then noted to the congregation that effective December 31, 2009, all contacts between members of the congregation and Pastor Cullen concerning pastoral services (funerals, weddings, counseling, etc.) must have prior written authority and permission of the moderator of the session, or, in the case of inability to contact the moderator, from the clerk of session.

The session's appointed committee of Gerry Jackson, Ardath Regan, and Randy Cook presented to the church the opportunity before the session to hire Revs. Ann and Bill Robertson collectively as our interim pastors in a part-time 6 month contractual relationship effective January 1, 2010 and pending input from the congregation. If hired, they would serve collectively serve part-time, not each individually serving part-time. They would likely be available for an additional 6 month contract beyond an initial 6 months. They are retired pastors and have made it clear a longer term relationship is not something they would accept or pursue. Much positive discussion was shared by many members of the church during this time. At the next regularly scheduled session meeting on December 14, 2009 the committee will make the motion to hire the Robertsons.

Gerry Jackson reported that a proposal had been made to session suggesting that the church switch to a part-time pastor for its next call. Session wished to hear the congregation's views on this proposal, so the matter was opened for discussion. Many points were raised, both for and against the proposal. During the discussion it became clear that the term "part-time" would have to be defined; for instance, there is a big difference between a half-time and three-quarters time, both of which could be viewed as "part-time".

It was generally agreed that the discussion would revert back to session. Session will appoint a committee to develop a part-time pastor job description for consideration by the congregation. The goal would be to have this done in time for the winter congregational meeting which is normally scheduled in early February. It was understood that the type of pastorate (part-time vs. full-time, level of experience, salary range, etc.) would all have to be decided fairly soon for the PNC to do its work, but it was generally agreed that this could probably wait until the winter congregational meeting.

The Rev. Louise Brokaw closed the discussion portion of this meeting with prayer after which Moderator Randy Cullen returned to the meeting and closed the meeting with prayer at 12:55 p.m.

Christian Education Committee

Outreach Committee

2009 involved continuing many of our successful projects from the previous years, including:

<u>Events</u> – The Outreach committee arranged for the fourth annual Fenton High School Ambassadors' Christmas concert the evening of December 6, which once again helped kick-off our church's Advent season. The Outreach Committee would like to thank the Congregational Care committee for providing cookies, punch, and coffee for those attending the concert.

The committee also organized the One Great Hour of Sharing Offering that was collected on Palm Sunday, April 5, and the Christmas Joy Offering that was collected Sunday, December 20.

The annual Christmas Adopt-A-Family event was once again a big success. This year, due to the difficult economic times, we adopted two families rather than the single family of the past. One family consisted of a single mother and two daughters, ages 11 and 13. The second family consisted of a single mother and two children, a girl, aged 4, and a boy, aged 8. The congregation generously provided wrapped Christmas gifts of new clothing, games and toys, as well as food and money, all of which were delivered to two very grateful families on Christmas Eve.

<u>Mission Programs</u> – We continued to provide financial support for two Campus Crusade for Christ mission programs: Sarah and Colby Keefer and their work with Athletes in Action at the University of Dayton in Ohio; and Allen and DeeDee Iobst and their work preaching the Gospel to Muslims as they cross between Europe and Africa at Algeciras, Spain.

<u>Projects</u> – Judy Studer continues to maintain and update our "Welcome" brochure's contents and the church bookmark, which includes a schedule of events on the back. This material is handed out to visitors at our Sunday worship services and at various community events. Ardath Regan developed a "Noah's Ark" pamphlet that can be used by members of the congregation to hand out when inviting people to attend worship, as well as an insert in the "Welcome" folder.

Ardath also developed a pamphlet to contact members who have disappeared from our regular Sunday church worship service to see if we can help them with transportation, or if they need special visits. The congregation can then take this over. The Outreach Committee has also spearheaded a project to collect canned goods and food, which are then turned over to the First Baptist Church in Holly for distribution to the needy.

<u>Website</u> – The church Website (www.hollypc.org) continues to function well. The AT&T file server that we use provides us with e-mail, a Website with good down load speeds, plus significant, secure off-site storage capacity, which has allowed us to backup important files from our church computer.

The average daily number of "visitors" for 2009 is 75.11, which is a very significant number for a small church's Website. The average number of pages viewed was 1.9, which means, on average, that each visitor looked at two pages per visit.

<u>Advertising / Promotion</u> – Creating top-of-the-mind awareness for our church using a limited budget continues to be a major challenge for the committee. Due to the difficult economic times in our area, newspapers that have traditionally welcomed PR releases from churches are now charging for publishing the information. In addition, *The Flint Journal* only publishes three times a week, is much reduced in terms of number of pages, and no longer has a church section. The *Oakland Press* also continues to struggle and has been less than responsive to our requests.

We continue to use the *Tri-County Times*' monthly Church Directory to publicize our Sunday School and church service schedules, in addition to our address and contact information. We also run small space advertising in the *Times*' Easter and Advent church directories to help promote our Palm Sunday and Easter Sunday services and our Christmas Eve service. In addition, we sponsored ads in the "Reunion With a Cause" walk for cancer program and in the "Holly High School Project Graduation."

We are a member of the Holly Chamber of Commerce, which allows us to include our brochures in their "Welcome" packages given to new families in the Holly area, as well as placing a small space ad in their annual directory. Because we are a non-profit organization, there is no charge for this membership.

Outreach Committee make-up -- The 2009 Outreach committee was made up of Barb Brown and Judy Studer, and was co-chaired by Ardath Regan and Walt Brown. Walt has finished his term on session and as the co-chair of the Outreach Committee, but will continue to manage the Website. Gerry Jackson will succeed Walt as co-chair of the committee. Please note that we can certainly use additional committee volunteers, all of whom will be warmly welcomed.

The biggest change in personnel this year was the resignation of Pastor Randy Cook, due to personal reasons. Randy announced he would be leaving the church over the summer, but stayed on as pastor until the end of December. His departure necessitated the formation of a new PNC committee, which was approved in January of 2010. In December, Ann and Bill Robertson were hired on as part-time interim pastors for a six month contract. This was handled through a special committee of the session.

In the fall of 2009 Teri Webner, our office manager, also announced her resignation, due to a new job opportunity. Teri assisted in advertising and interviewing for a new office manager. Interviews were conducted by Randy Cook, Teri Webner and myself and in December of 2009 Allie Hoover was hired. Teri remained on staff through January to train Allie.

All staff received job performance reviews in the Spring of 2009. Each paid employee was reviewed by a personnel committee member, someone directly involved in their area of work and Randy Cullen. The review process went smoothly, and each employee appreciated the opportunity to discuss their position. Each employee received a good review, but no raises were given this year due to financial constraints of the church. Formal reviews will be conducted again this year.

Property Committee

THE YEAR IN REVIEW:

WORK DAY 05/09/09:

The Fellowship Hall walls got a new coat of paint, the same color as the narthex with white trim.

LOWER LEVEL FLOOD:

A pipe froze pushing a fitting off and flooded the basement in February of 2009.

The old tile floor was replaced with new tile and base in all areas under the Fellowship Hall. The cost of the repairs was covered by our insurance company.

EAST SIDE ROOF OF FELLOWSHIP HALL:

The roof was stripped, twelve sheets of rotted plywood replaced and re-shingled at a cost of around \$3,500.00 with the money coming from Pennies from Heaven fund and donations from the roof material drive

BOILERS:

I met with Kirk MacDonald of The Hartford Steam Boiler Inspection Co. in December. He was inspecting our boilers for the State of Michigan licenses, which is required every three years. The laws for boilers have changed; we are now required to have a maintenance schedule and yearly testing by a licensed mechanical contractor for safety devices and controls. I talked to Mr. MacDonald about the condition of our boilers and he recommended that we do not replace the boilers at this time. He said the recovery cost in energy savings is at least seven years. He recommended having money saved (which we do have a boiler fund) because replacement is coming for the small boiler under the chapel which will fail in five years or less.

BOILER COST:

A.S.S.I. price \$ 32,500 (high efficiency same location)

R. P. Walker Plumbing \$61,000 (high efficiency both in large boiler room and re-pipe for boilers) Stoutenburg Plumbing LLC \$32,000 (high efficiency same location includes hot water heater, reuse newer pumps)

A.S.S.I. Mitsubishi S series heat pump units for heating and cooling \$59,000

Nash landscaping is doing snow removal and salting this year. Many thanks to Dan Nash for a job well done. He also is handling the grass cutting.

Stewardship Committee

The 2009 Proposed Budget was approved with a \$24,000 deficit. Congregational pledges increased \$2000 from the prior year and the estimates of the non-pledge giving remained the same. Although the economy continued its downturn, the actual year-end deficit was \$12,000. This was an improvement from prior year's deficit of \$21,000. The difference between the estimated and the actual year deficit was due changes in the following categories:

Other Payroll, Church Programs Mission Outreach Operations.

Fundraising efforts were increased and the most income generated from the church's 150th Anniversary Celebration.

The 2010 Proposed Budget was approved with modest increases in congregational pledges and no changes in proposed spending with the exception of the following categories:

Terms of call – pastor's salary Other payroll – new secretary Church programs – PNC started

This includes sharing Christ's message with the community by opening our church and our lives to God's people. Our ministry is about more than the bottom line. It's about people. If we follow God's call to ministry, He will provide for our needs. The question we have to ask ourselves is, "Are we answering that call?"

Worship Committee

The celebration of our 150th anniversary was a great success; the sanctuary was full for the first time in a long time, with approximately 130 in attendance. Sadly, Randy Cullen, our pastor of two years, announced his plans to leave Michigan to join his wife Karen in Maryland. Following Pastor Cullen's announcement our attendance at worship took a considerable drop. Service attendance was down all summer to an average of 40 but increased to around 50 in September through the fall and into Christmas. The overall average attendance for 2009 was 55.

There were some significant changes made in the sanctuary in 2009. We bought new hymnals to help improve our music and bring it up to date. The hymnals were paid for through dedications from the congregation. New Bibles, that match the hymnals, were also purchased by the congregation through a bible drive. Jordan Howe has returned to lead our contemporary service which will be on the third Sunday of the month through 2010. Julia has been doing a terrific job as our music/choir director and has made a point of playing the organ, as well as piano, to enrich the music program. Julia also leads the bell choir which performed during the Lenten and Advent seasons in 2009.

Worship has been working on cleaning house all year long, we continue to organize and weed through our music collection which we plan to have completed by the spring of 2010. Worship has also organized the storage room, gathered all the old wax candles and made them available for purchase as we no longer have a use for them. Oil candles have been used which are more economical and cleaner.

Worship is looking forward to the future. It will be an exciting and prosperous time for Holly Presbyterian Church as we embark on wonderful journey with Jesus Christ leading the way for us.
