As we move toward the Season of Advent in the Church calendar, we come to a time of remembering and waiting. We remember how the Israelites waited for their Messiah to come. They had a hopeful expectation that their Savior would come and save them from Roman reign.

In Advent, we not only remember the waiting for the first coming of Christ, but also we actively participate in the waiting for Christ to come again. We say the Lord's Prayer asking God for "Thy Kingdom come". We remember God's promise to us for Christ to come and a new kingdom to come. We have a hopeful expectation of this.

But what does this hopeful expectation look like? Are we stumbling? Is our expectation of a new kingdom similar to what the Israelites were expectant of in a Messiah? When Jesus came into the world, he brought a completely different idea

of Messiah, a Savior of the world, not a political king to reign over the Jewish people.

To a point, we are in the dark of what this kingdom will look like, and what the second coming would be. Historically, our expectations tend to fall short. Yet we are still to have this hopeful expectation of Christ coming.

We learn how to look forward, by looking back and remembering Christ's coming into the world. We were in the darkness, and Christ's light came into our world. We light candles each week of Advent as a sign of Christ's light coming again into our world and read passages of Isaiah to remember what this promised kingdom looks like, learning how to have a hopeful expectation for the kingdom and revising us when we fall short in that expectation.

May God help us to have a revised more hopeful expectation that leaves no one out of the Kingdom this Advent season, and may we be open to the Holy Spirit working within us to work towards this new Kingdom.

The word *advent* means "coming" or "arrival." In the church, Advent marks the beginning of the liturgical year while it prepares us for the end of time. In many churches and homes, people light candles during each of the four Sundays symbolizing progression -- a movement toward something grand. We move toward the day of the coming of Christ, the Child, Messiah and Light of the World.

During each of the Sundays of Advent, the scripture readings exemplify the two-edged sword of the season – the coming of the Christ child and the coming of God's final realm. While we hold fast to hope, we see that we also must be ready and on the watch.

Luke 2:1-21, which tells of the birth of Jesus, contains some of the most beloved passages of the Bible. Angels and shepherds serve as the ones to announce the Messiah's birth, and Mary treasures and ponders what they say about her newborn son. Mary has opened her life to God, so that others too may be blessed. Through no conscious choice of her own, a baby emerges from the quiet, cushiony warmth of the womb into an entirely strange environment filled with harsh temperatures and textures. There is no going back. This first Christmas, as has been true from the beginning, is laced with contrasts. Even from the glorious story of Jesus' beginnings we know that Christ was born into the world so that He could die and save the world. Even death is where life is found, for death is not the final word but the beginning of a new and glorious life. "Do not be afraid: for see – I am bringing you good news of great joy for all the people." The Good News is that in spite of our faithlessness God is faithful and Jesus Christ was resurrected, for God so loved the world that he gave his only begotten Son that whoever believed might have everlasting Life.
