Ordinary Time ... Reflections From Your Pastor

This is the day that the Lord has made; let us rejoice and be glad in it. Psalm 118:24

So here we are. What a journey we have been on since last fall! We jumped into Advent, had a joyous Christmas and before we knew it, Lent and Easter was upon us. There was hardly a break between one observance to the next. And on May 20th, we celebrated the birthday of Christ's Church with the coming of the powerful Holy Spirit and ended the month with Trinity Sunday as we gave thanks for the Triune God – Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

Now with June here, we go back to what the liturgical calendar calls *Ordinary Time*. After all the big celebrations that sounds kind of ... well ... ordinary, doesn't it? I know, I wrote some about it just last month, but now that it's here, let's think about it a little, shall we?

I'm actually very thankful for Ordinary Time. I think our Worship Team is, as well. We have a little bit of a break with not so much to plan for a while. From the Lion's Den

In this season I have been exploring dimensions of what it means to become an "upside-down" church. Following the model of Christ in Philippians 2, an upside-down church empties itself of privilege, inverts the social ladder, and adopts the role of a servant.



This is a necessary shift not only in mission but in our internal power structures as well. The upcoming General Assembly being held in mid-June in St. Louis will be a test as to

whether the PCUSA has the courage and will to begin this transformation in its own power structures. In that regard it may be the most significant Assembly of the century for the future of the church. This Assembly will receive reports from three task forces charged with addressing the future mission of the denomination:

• *The Way Forward Commission* was charged with finding ways to bring our denominational structures in line with the new realities of shrinking membership and declining finances.

The Vision 20/20 Task Force will make an initial report on its charge to present a new mission statement and direction for the denomination's public profile.

The All-Agency Review Committee will issue its once-every-six-years report on how our General Assembly agencies collaborate for the good of the church and its mission.

But much of the energy at the upcoming Assembly will be focused on a proposal to raise the General Assembly portion of the per capita assessment by 39% in 2019 and another 7% in 2020, an increase of nearly \$4.00 per member. Per capita assessments fund the administrative costs of operating our church agencies and holding the biennial General Assembly. Presbyteries are required to pay the assessment in full, based on their total membership. A presbytery may pass the expense on to its churches together with a per capita assessment for its own operation.

The problem is that many churches do not have the available resources to add \$4 per member to their denominational support without decreasing mission giving proportionally. This is the opposite direction from an "inside-out, upside-down" church. There are many good reasons why the per capita budget must increase (it has been kept artificially low for a decade) - but what is disappointing about this increase is that it represents a failure of missional imagination and adaptive leadership.

The same is true of the three task force reports coming to the Assembly - at a time when bold vision is needed, for the most part their recommendations are designed to maintain the status quo rather than chart a new direction. We face challenges that cannot be met with technical fixes. If the challenge is defined as "How does the PCUSA fulfill the mission of Christ in a post-Christendom, post-denominational society?" Then I think the model of mission and governance would need to change:

Change the model of a "congregation" to discipleship and mission communities

Change the model of "minister" to discipleship and mission leader. Give greater latitude to adapting standards locally by presbytery.

Move away from a membership model (and membership based funding model) to a model based on a shared commitment to mission

Shift the function of the national church (if one is needed) from serving institutions to serving mission

Ground our connectional life in commitment to shared principles and mission goals, not shared laws (what organizational leaders call a "centered-set" model, as opposed to a "bounded-set" model)

Allow maximal local interpretation of mission priorities

This would lead to some structural changes, but the form would follow function. For example, it might lead to smaller presbyteries where executive leadership would not be required; the reduction of synod functions to administrative and judicial review; a rethinking of the property trust clause; and restructuring national offices to support congregations and grassroots mission networks.

The result would be a leaner, bottom-up model of mission and governance for a post-denominational society, while preserving core Presbyterian values. I doubt that will happen at this Assembly, but it is a direction in which we need to head if we are to become the inside-out, upside-down church for our time.
